
Loving God,

How do we get beyond greeting to welcome?



Why We Invite: We have so much to offer people today

- We have the oldest Christian tradition.
- We have a vibrant Christian tradition that offers people essential dimensions of discipleship: scriptural, sacramental, communal, moral, and social justice.
- We are “Catholic”—we welcome everyone!
- Our tradition centers on Jesus Christ; it reinforces our relationship with Jesus and the Spirit in multiple ways.
- Our tradition can negotiate between the worlds of faith and intellect; we are not fundamentalists, fideists, or deists.

Pope Francis on Why We Share

We share because of the joy we have as believers.

"The Joy of the Gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ joy is constantly born anew."

Why We Share (cont'd)

- Spiritual hungers are everywhere because so much of modern life is causing doubts and stress.
- Humans need to have a deep sense of meaning and purpose.
- Growing numbers of people who are “unattached” and are possibly open to being attached to communities of value and faith



Inviting Others

To invite people, to share faith, is an opportunity to enhance their lives in accord with the freedom and deepest desires of their hearts.

We are basically inviting people into the Kingdom that Jesus inaugurated for all of humankind.

Conversion

In “seeking to convert” others, Catholics offer people the opportunity to respond to God’s Good News, the Kingdom of God, from their personal freedom because of the richness that will come to their lives by knowing Jesus, and living in his Spirit, in the Catholic tradition.

- To the Kingdom of God embodied in Jesus
- To respond to the Holy Spirit at work in the person and the world
- To stand in living continuity with the community in which Jesus dwells
- To begin to experience the Kingdom now through a life of discipleship

Salvation - The Fullness of Life and Love

- Salvation is a crucial issue.
- Humankind needs to be saved.
- Humans cannot save themselves.
- Human beings cannot satisfy their need for “transcendence”—a context of meaning that goes beyond their decades of life.
- Jesus comes precisely to give us the “fullness of life and love” which we quest.



Discipleship

- To invite people to the RCIA is to invite them to a life of discipleship.
- To ask people to serve the Kingdom is either to invite people to become disciples or to deepen a discipleship that has already begun.



Personal Sphere

- Witnessing to my faith by my life
- Sharing faith with other Catholics
- Knowing my own story of faith
- Sharing faith with others in a way that is appropriate in the lives of people we are engaging.
- Conversation with peers—coworkers, friends
- With friends' gatherings in our homes for meals
- Or gatherings at Christmas and Easter
- Or gathering for celebrations of the sacraments or other family events



- Support parishioners in their inviting—meet their guests, thank them for inviting.







Pope Francis on How to Invite

Instead of seeming to impose new obligations, [believers] should appear as people who wish to share their joy, who point to a horizon of beauty and who invite others to a delicious banquet. It is not by proselytizing that the Church grows, but “by attraction.” (14)

- “For if we have received the love which restores meaning to our lives, how can we fail to share that love with others?” (8)
- “Consequently, an evangelizer must never look like someone who has just come back from a funeral!” (10)
- “Clearly Jesus does not want us to be grandees who look down upon others, but men and women of the people.” (271)

The Joy of the Gospel

Encounter



Evangelization can only happen when we have established a relationship with another, and that person gives us permission to talk about faith.



Pope Francis on How to Engage

“In this (personal) preaching, which is always respectful and gentle, the first step is personal dialogue, when the other person speaks and shares his or her joys, hopes and concerns for loved ones, or so many other heartfelt needs. Only afterwards is it possible to bring up God’s word, perhaps by reading a Bible verse or relating a story, but always keeping in mind the fundamental message: the personal love of God who became man, who gave himself up for us, who is living and who offers us his salvation and his friendship.”

Attitudes for Inviting



- Friendly and joyous
- Open and accessible
- Humble, led by the Spirit of Jesus
- Sharing on an even level
- Non-argumentative
- Speaking from the heart, not just “the head”



Evangelization

- Primarily peer-to-peer
- Have people think about their “networks” of associates—friends, co-workers, neighbors.
- Encourage more active Catholics to invite less-than-active Catholics to various renewals, or social events, or other gatherings.
- Create opportunities for parishioners to have a reason to share—parish and neighborhood events.

NO to Proselytizing



- Dismissing others' faith
- Assuming others are damned
- Stereotyping others in a way that is unfair
- Assuming others are not able to be led by the Spirit
- Offering false motives for faith (e.g., benefits, advancement, “ticket to heaven”)

RCIA



- How do we talk about the RCIA to parishioners and to others?
- How do we get the invitation out?
- Do people know the RCIA is an opportunity for us to discover Jesus in their lives?
- Do people know the RCIA is an invitation to conversion and discipleship?

Chatting up the RCIA



The most important message we have—encountering Jesus today!

The “Good News” that we live, celebrate, and dare to share with others

A process to help people know the depths of their own searching, grow in their acceptance of Jesus, and be assured that Jesus is in their lives



RCIA:

One of the Essential Ministries of the Parish

- Only 15% of Catholic parishes have a year-round RCIA—85% do not.
- How many parishes only “advertise” the RCIA during the summer months?
- How many parishes tell inquirers to “come back in September” when the RCIA begins?
- How many seekers even feel that the Catholic Church is inviting them to Jesus Christ?

Adult Converts-- Decline



Give people a time and a zoom connection to talk to
someone in the pre-Catechumenal ministry.

We're always wanting to meet and chat with you!

- **Special Focus:**

Ask congregation to put out “invites” to people who have
ever asked them about faith, friends without a church,
people thinking of marrying Catholics.

- **Safe-distance Reception**

A comfortable room large enough for people to
feel they can ask questions but not be too close to others


